Message from our board chairs

Thank you for clicking on our 2025–2026 annual report for the Fish & Wildlife Compensation Program’s (FWCP) Coastal Region.

This report includes an overview of how our regional boards allocated annual compensation project funding provided by BC Hydro across grant types (i.e. annual or year-round) and delivery mechanisms (i.e. grants, directed projects). This report also includes an overview of projects approved by our Coastal Region board and links to each project on fwcp.ca. Our annual project outcomes report will be available this fall. Be sure to subscribe or follow us on social media so you don’t miss it.

Many of you may know that our primary obligation is to compensate for the impacts to fish, wildlife and their habitats resulting from construction of BC Hydro dams. That’s because BC Hydro made voluntary commitments to compensate for dam impacts across the 14 watersheds that make up our Coastal Region.

Since 1999, we have been the mechanism by which BC Hydro fulfills its voluntary commitments to compensate for dam impacts in our Coastal Region.

One of the best ways we can do that is by protecting high-quality habitat. And this year we approved ~\$130,000 to help fund the purchases of two land conservation projects: one is for 55 hectares in the Kanaka Bar area between Boston Bar and Lytton in the Fraser Canyon; and just over one hectare for the Murray-Carson Conservation Property near Salmon Arm in the Shuswap River Watershed.

In the Puntledge River Watershed, the Comox Valley Project Watershed Society moved closer to completing the restoration of a former sawmill site in Courtenay by removing a steel retaining wall along the shoreline. With lots of volunteer help, and long-term funding from us, the site is closer than ever to being restored to a natural area that can support salmon populations. This project is led by Project Watershed delivered in partnership with the City of Courtenay and the Komoks First Nations.

In the Campbell River Watershed, the Discovery Coast Greenways Land Trust continued restoring the ecological function of the estuary.

Our board met with project proponents to learn more about work to conserve blue-listed purple martins. These are just a few of the 27 fish & wildlife projects we approved in 2025–2026 for ~\$2.16 million.

In 2024 our boards approved a project effectiveness and performance measurement strategy as recommended in our most recent audit. Following on this important strategic work to develop a logic model, we embarked on a process to update our approach to project funding in 2025–2026. We will be continuing this renewal process in 2026–2027 and will be engaging with First Nations and interest holders about new priorities for compensation funding. We’re excited about these changes and look forward to sharing more with you next year.

Let us take a moment to thank public board member Laurie Kremsator, who retired from the board after nearly seven years. We’d like to welcome two new public members, Carla Corbett and Charlotte Olson, who joined during this year.

1. Overview

Our Coastal Region was established in 1999 as a voluntary initiative by BC Hydro in response to First Nations and public interest holders to address the impacts of BC Hydro dams.

The region is made up of 14 watersheds where BC Hydro dams are located on Vancouver Island, the Lower Mainland, the Central and Sunshine Coasts, and watersheds in the Southern Interior (e.g., Bridge-Seton and Shuswap River).

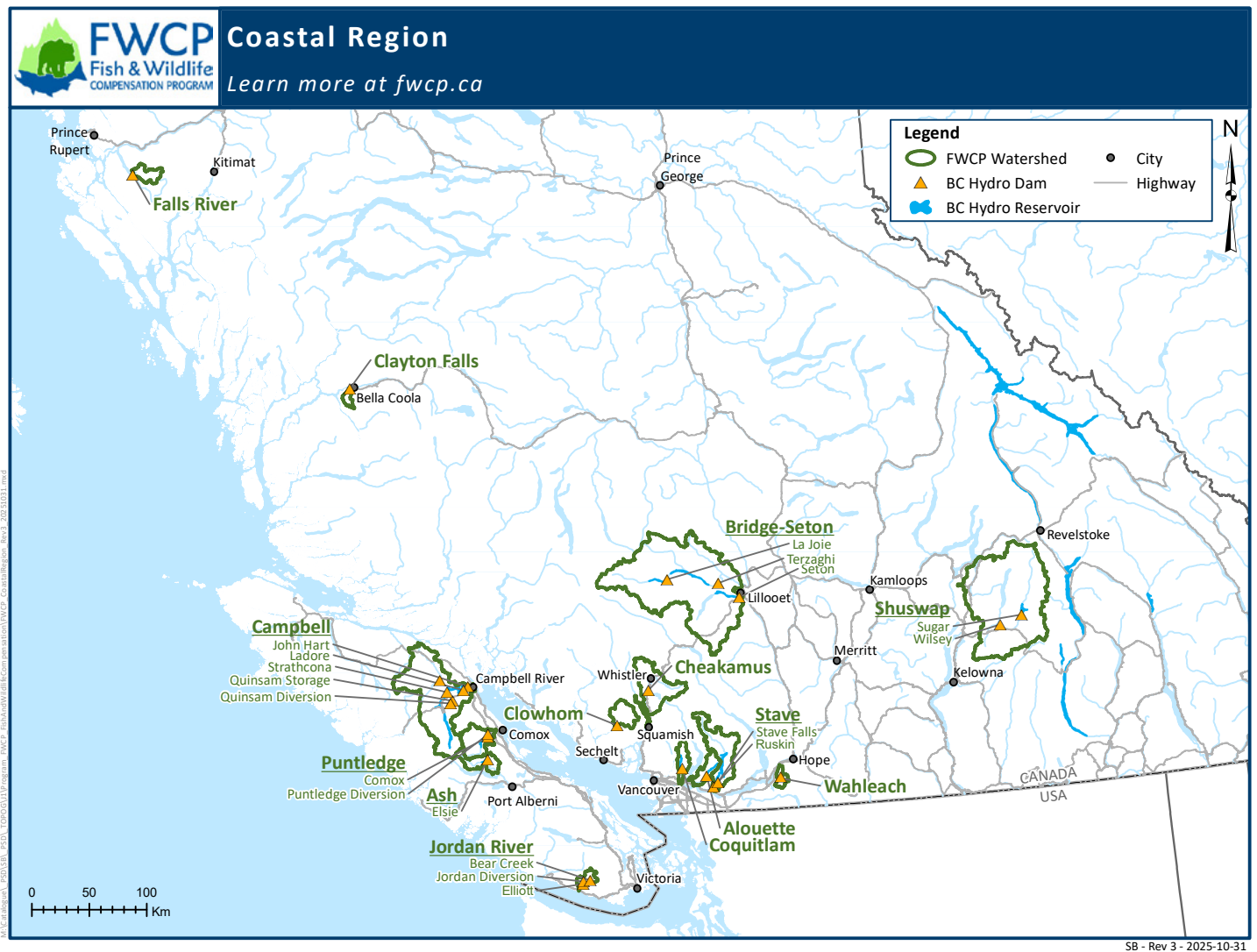


Figure 1.1: Map of our Coastal Region

The Coastal Region has received more than \$53 million from BC Hydro since it started to fulfill voluntary commitments BC Hydro made to compensate for impacts to fish, wildlife, and their habitats following the construction of its dams. This has enabled the FWCP to fund approximately 30 compensation projects each year. Our Coastal Region is shown below in Figure 1.1.

Since 1998, BC Hydro has provided more than \$53 million to our Coastal Region to compensate for dam impacts, funding more than 500 projects.

2. Our strategic approach

While the FWCP operates in watersheds that have been altered by hydroelectric development, our vision recognizes that an effective program can support the maintenance of healthy fish and wildlife populations that will meet its conservation objectives. Actions focused on conserving and, where possible, restoring ecosystem function will help species be more resilient to emerging pressures, such as climate change, and the cumulative effects of other overlapping resource developments. We take a forward-looking, ecosystem-based approach that defines the desired outcomes and takes actions to restore, enhance, and conserve priority species and their habitats, in alignment with our strategic approach. 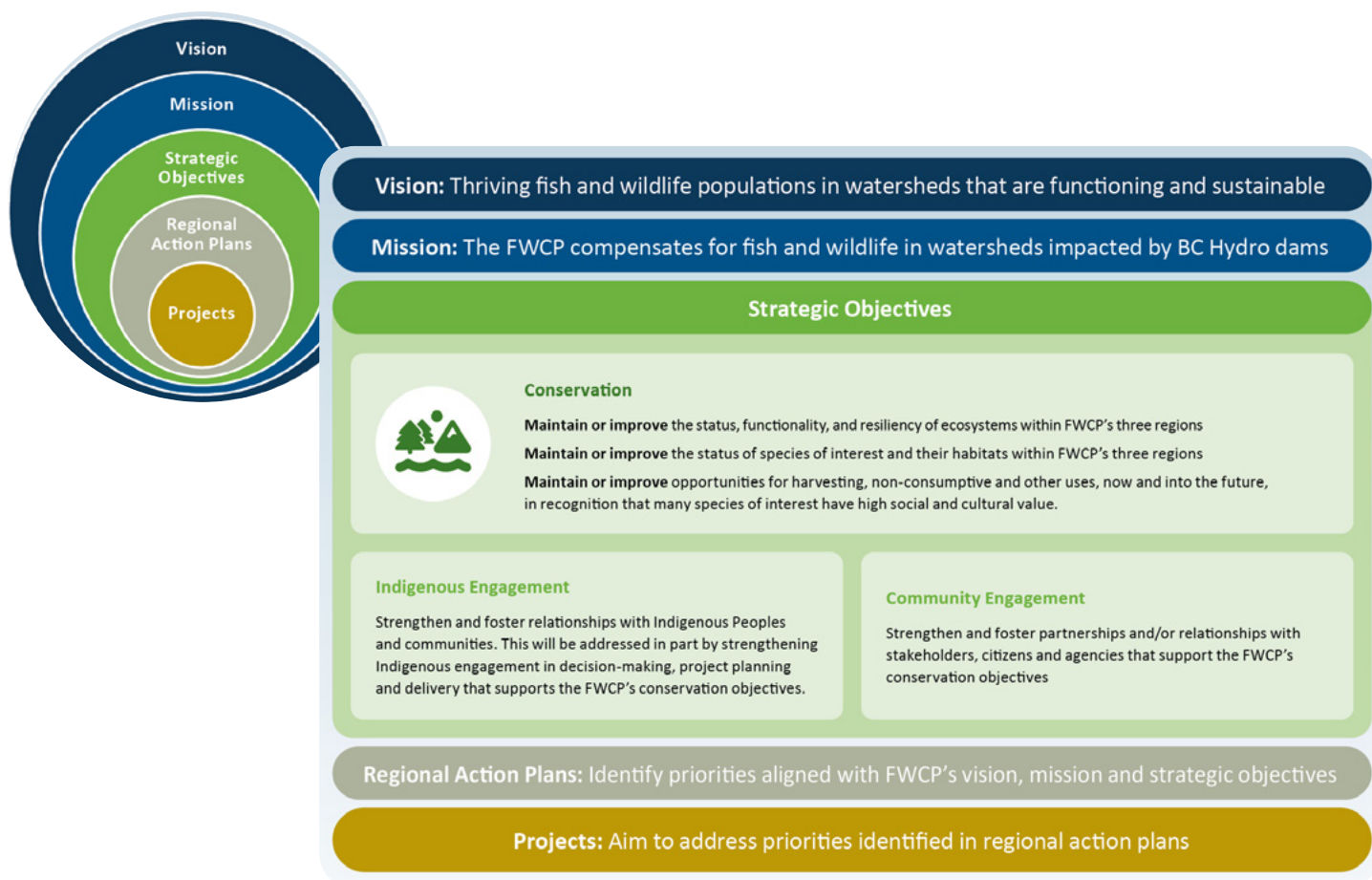


Figure 2.1: Strategic framework. The projects we fund align with our regional action plans, reflect our strategic objectives, and advance our mission and vision.

Our regional action plans guide FWCP investments in fish and wildlife compensation projects. They are referenced annually by our regional boards to track progress toward implementation, set priorities, and guide decision-making in setting out and approving the annual operating plan for each region. Actions in our [action plans](#) are eligible for FWCP funding and align with our vision, mission, and geographic scope.

In our Coastal Region, we have 14 watershed-based action plans, and all F26 projects approved for funding by our Coastal Region board align with priority actions identified in the action plans.

UPDATE: EVALUATION AND FINANCIAL AUDIT

In 2019, an independent third-party evaluation and financial audit was completed, as required by our Governance Manual. The auditor made nine recommendations to refine, support, and strengthen our approach to conserving and enhancing fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by BC Hydro dams. The recommendations have been substantially completed and the FWCP has reported to the Comptroller of Water Rights and the steering committee—as per the FWCP's [governance manual](#).

3. Financial report

APPROVED BUDGET AND EXPENDITURES

Our Coastal Region board allocates annual funding toward fish and wildlife compensation projects, First Nations engagement, and other activities as outlined below. These allocations form the annual operating plan. Any unallocated funds are carried forward as uncommitted available funds for future spending.

BC Hydro provided \$2,614,050 to the FWCP to fulfill BC Hydro’s voluntary commitment to address the impacts of dam construction. Our board approved a budget of \$2,701,165, utilizing unspent surplus funds from previous years.

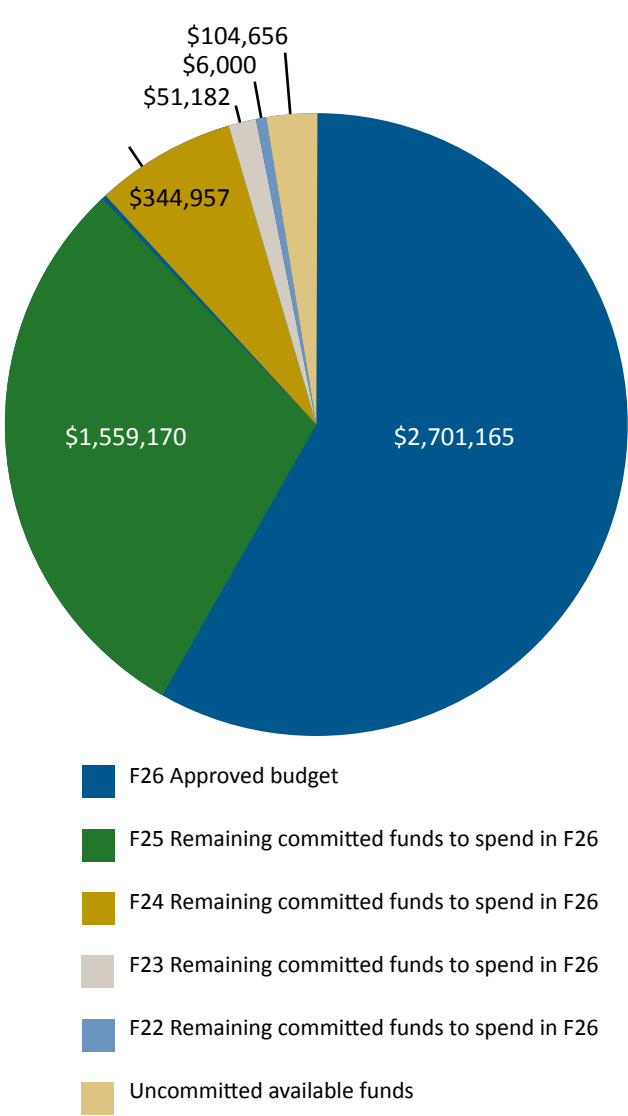


Figure 3.1: FWCP Coastal Region financial summary on April 1, 2025

Figure 3.1 shows a total of approximately \$4.76 million available to our Coastal Region as of April 1, 2025. This includes the approved budget of approximately \$2.7 million, the uncommitted available funds of approximately \$105,000, and the remaining prior-year funding commitments from F25 to F22 of just under \$2 million, as shown below.

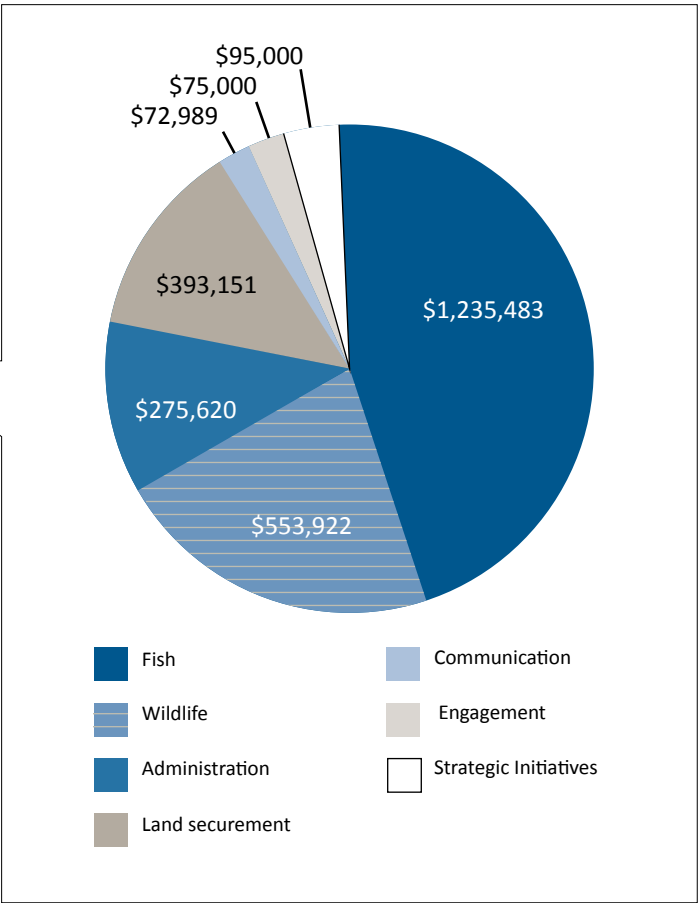


Figure 3.2: Allocation of the approved Coastal Region budget of \$2,701,165 as of April 1, 2025

Figure 3.2 illustrates the approved budget for F26 as of April 1, 2025. Funding for fish projects accounted for nearly 46% of the budget, wildlife projects 20%, and land securement 15%. Administrative costs, including safety and professional development training, accounted for just over 10% of the budget and strategic initiatives, including implementing the logic model and funding to support renewing our project funding approach, accounted for approximately 4%.

Coastal Region expenditures up to the end of the fiscal year (March 31, 2026) are shown in Table 3.1. This reflects a snapshot of actual and planned payments made related to this year's finances. Funding allocated each year may not be fully expended by year-end, and as shown in Table 3.1, F26 funds not yet expended by March 31, 2026, are labelled as planned payments.

Occasionally, compensation projects come in under budget (unspent funds in Table 3.1). Funds not spent during the fiscal year will be carried forward as unspent surplus budget and made available for new spending in future fiscal years. Funds identified as land securement are approved for a reserve fund that, if remain unspent, are carried forward and made available for future land securement projects.

Note 1: Variance is carried forward and available for the next fiscal year. In the instance of a negative amount, the money was taken from previously uncommitted funds and added to the line item, making them committed and increasing the expected spend/planned payment. If the number is positive, it means that the money is released from this line item and returned to uncommitted funds.

Note 2: Planned payments represent expected invoices for approved ongoing compensation projects that have not yet submitted final reports by March 31, 2026.

At the end of this reporting period, approximately \$1.27 million of the annual budget had been spent, and approximately \$1.39 million¹ remained as an F26 commitment to spend in F27.

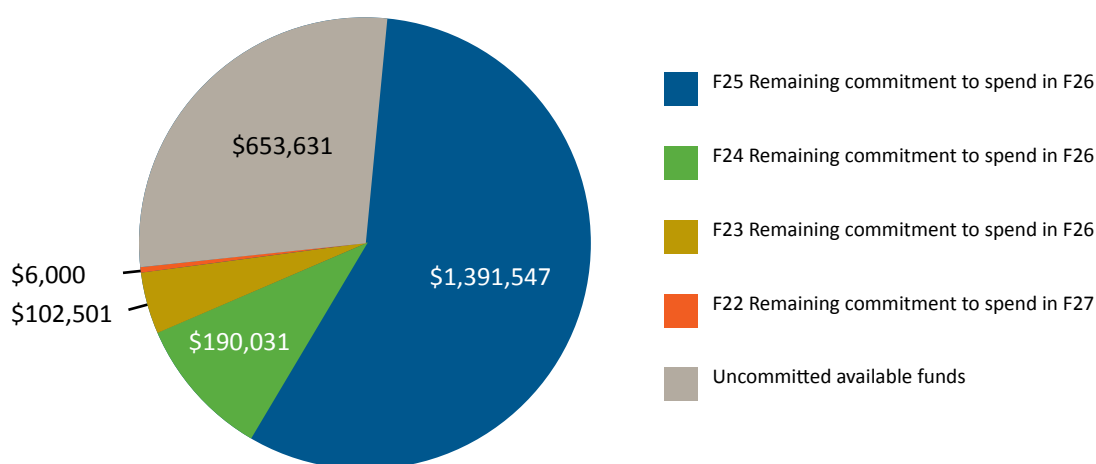


Figure 3.3: Financial summary of our Coastal Region, as of March 31, 2026 (end of fiscal year)

In addition to the planned payments of \$1.39 million, the balance of prior-year funding commitments anticipated to be spent in F27 was nearly \$300,000 from F25 to F22, with approximately \$654,000 available in uncommitted funds (Figure 3.3).

1. The end of fiscal F26 and the year-end deadline for project reporting are on the same day. Therefore, reports (and potentially statements of accounts) are not reviewed and accepted until after the March 31 deadline, causing them to be associated with the next fiscal (F27). Many final payments for F26 projects are processed in the first few months of F27, and unspent funds are allocated for future spending.

4. Approved project funding

This fiscal year, our three regional boards approved 91 compensation projects for a total FWCP investment of approximately \$9.46 million. The total value of these projects, including leveraged funding from other organizations and in-kind resources, was nearly \$97 million.

Twenty-seven projects were approved this year for \$2,160,046 in funding from our Coastal Region board.

Grant-based projects

The FWCP’s annual grant intake opens each July and closes in early November. All grant applications go through a three-stage review process. For more details, [visit our FAQs](#). Grant applicants are required to develop a project idea that aligns with one or more priority actions in any action plan and will achieve the intended outcome.

Of the 27 projects approved for the year, 19 were grant-based (10 fish and nine wildlife), for a total of \$1,921,518. The board allocated 60% of project funding for fish projects (\$1,146,303) and 40% for wildlife (\$775,215). As a result of financial partnerships and in-kind contributions, the total value of the projects was more than \$10 million. In other words, for every \$1 invested by the FWCP, others contributed nearly \$4.75, greatly increasing the value of the FWCP’s investment overall.

Directed projects

Approximately \$239,000 was approved for eight directed projects (i.e., a project prioritized by the board), excluding funds allocated for land securement. The eight directed projects included hatchery operations, the distribution of chum salmon carcasses in the Puntledge River Watershed, and improvement of fish passage in the Coquitlam and Alouette River watersheds.

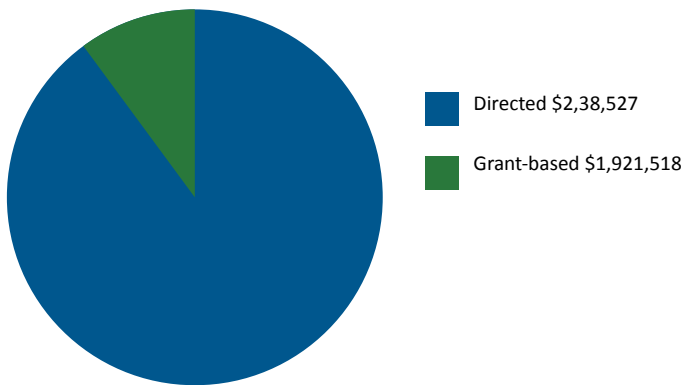


Figure 4.1: F26 directed project funding and grant-based project funding

Land securement projects

As part of directed projects, the Coastal Region board sets aside approximately 15% of its annual funding to a land securement reserve fund. In F26, the board allocated \$393,151 toward the reserve fund. For F26, our Coastal Region board utilized unspent funds from previous years and allocated \$530,378 towards three land securement purchases:

- Puntledge River Timber Reservation (Phase 3)—100 hectares: \$400,000 to Comox Valley Land Trust
- Kanaka Bar (Jackass and Across-the-River conservation properties)—55 hectares: approximately \$90,000 to Nature-Based Solutions Foundation.
- Nearly \$40,300 was allocated for a land purchase in the Shuswap River Watershed that has not been publicly announced at the time of publication.

Projects by proponent type

The Coastal Region board approved funding for a total of 27 projects: eight directed projects and 19 grant-based projects. Nearly 79% of the approved funding went toward projects led by non-government organizations, and approximately 20% went to First Nations—a fifteen-fold increase compared to two years ago. 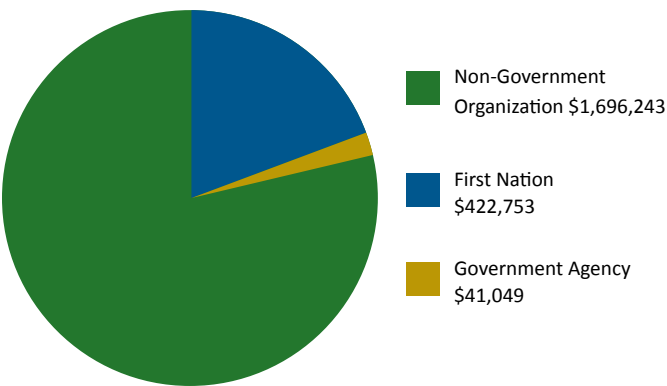


Figure 4.2: Coastal F26 approved projects by lead proponent type

Community Engagement Grant projects

The goal of the [Community Engagement Grant](#) is to provide small grants of up to \$1,500 to support activities that align with our strategic objectives. Groups can apply for a Community Engagement Grant at any time during the year, while funds are available.

A total annual budget of \$15,000—a 50% increase over the previous year—was set aside for Community Engagement Grant funding. Fifteen applications were received, and 13 were approved. The full list of approved Community Engagement Grants is shown in Table 4.1.

Projects by action type

Priority actions in our Coastal Region [action plans](#) are grouped into five action types:

1. research and information acquisition
2. habitat-based
3. species-based
4. monitoring and evaluation
5. land securement

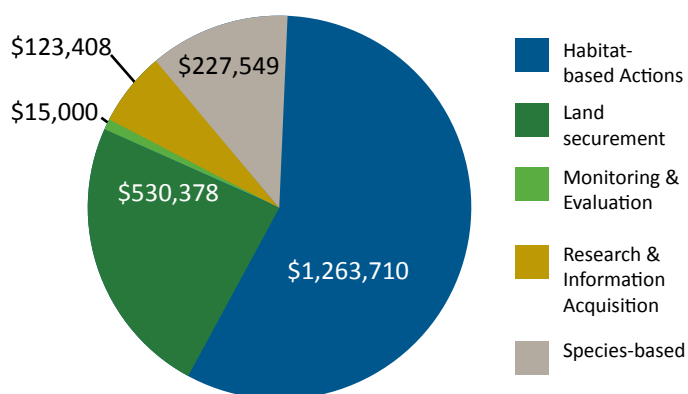


Figure 4.3: Breakdown of approved funding by action type

This year, approximately 59% of the approved funding was allocated to habitat-based projects, and nearly 25% on land securement projects. Figure 4.3 shows the breakdown of approved funding by action type.
