Arrow Lakes Reservoir Nutrient Restoration Program Update

The Nutrient Restoration Program (NRP) in Arrow Lakes Reservoir started in 1999 to replace nutrients that would otherwise be flowing into the reservoir but are trapped upstream by dams. The nutrient additions are intended to support the food chain, starting with micro-organisms, and lead up to kokanee and piscivorous (fish-eating) bull and

rainbow trout. But managing the NRP can be a challenging prospect. Read more
