2016-2017 Projects Underway

Our Board approved funding for 20 fish and wildlife projects across our Peace Region for 2016-17. The projects will help conserve and enhance a variety of species including Bull Trout, Arctic Grayling, bats, migrating birds, Moose, Northern Caribou, and other ungulates. While some projects will result in immediate benefits to improve habitat, such as prescribed burns to increase ungulate forage, others will improve the science and understanding for the long-term management of species. Project Breakdown

In 2016-17, our Peace Region Board approved approximately \$970,000 in project funding. See the [full breakdown](#) of how these funds are split between fish and wildlife projects, by sub-region, proponent and project type. Across the province, FWCP is funding more than [116 fish and wildlife projects](#) for a total of approximately \$8.7 million within its Coastal, Columbia, and Peace Regions.

Fish Samples Wanted from First Nations for Mercury Study

With funding from the FWCP, a comprehensive [two year mercury investigation](#) is being led by Azimuth Consulting Partnership Group. Participation of local First Nation communities is key to the success of the project, [including the collection of fish samples](#). If interest is expressed, First Nations will be provided information and training as samples need to be collected using standard protocols. While they can be from any species of fish in the Williston and Dinosaur watersheds, of special interest is fish from frequently-used fishing locations, and sizes that are typically consumed. Grant Intake Opens July 15

The opening and closing dates of our next grant application intake, including the deadline for our mandatory Notice of Intent, have all been moved forward compared to last year. For 2017-18 projects, grant applications can be received **starting July 15**, with the deadline for the Notice of Intent form on **September 21**. All grant applications must be submitted by **October 28, 2016**. Funding decisions will be announced in March 2017.
