Grant applications for fish and wildlife projects are due this month. We fund projects that align with our Action Plans. If you're applying for a grant you must have submitted a mandatory <u>Notice of Intent</u> by September 8, 2017. Contact Peace Region Manager, <u>Chelsea Coady</u> if you have questions. <u>Grant</u> <u>applications</u> are due Friday October 27, 2017 by 5 p.m. PDT.

Scott West Caribou Herd likely extirpated

Many central mountain caribou populations throughout British Columbia have declined significantly over the years. A project, funded by the FWCP, attempted to determine if one sub population, the Scott West Caribou herd was still in existence, but the results indicate that it is likely extirpated - or locally extinct. <u>Read more</u>
