FWCP remembers Murray Pearson

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of Murray Pearson, longterm fisheries technician with the Province of B.C., at Meadow Creek Spawning Channel. Murray died August 19 while fly-fishing at one of his favourite spots on Fry Creek near Kootenay Lake. He had worked for more than 30 years at the channel, monitoring kokanee fry emigration in the spring, recording kokanee spawners in the fall, and looking after operations during other months of the year.
