24 northern leopard frog egg masses found in 2020

Twenty-four northern leopard frog egg masses were found in the Creston Valley in the last field season, one of the highest observed counts since monitoring started there in 2000. The field team caged 18 of the egg masses to protect them from predators and increase survival for this endangered amphibian. <u>MORE</u>.

Garbage removed and trees planted along the Slocan River

More than 100 tires were removed from the shoreline as part of the Slocan River Riparian Enhancement Project led by the Slocan River Streamkeepers. Fifty native cottonwood, willow, alder, red osier dogwood, cedar, and spruce trees were planted, and five swallow nesting boxes were installed. Thanks to members of the local community for hauling all the tires to the transfer station, and thanks to the Youth Climate Corps for all their work!
